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Post 16 Options for SEN learners

All young people need advice and guidance in order to prepare for their future. A SEN young person may face additional challenges to achieving their goals, they may need extra support as they move on from school to college, or from education into adult life and we hope our prospectus will support young people on their journey.

What are the options after a child turns 16?

A child can legally leave school at the end of the school year in which they turn 16 (normally the end of year 11). But, all young people must be in some kind of education or training until the age of 18. This can be combined with paid or voluntary work.

Staying at school

A child may move into the sixth form of their school or move to another school. By staying in school a young person is offered structure and familiarity. This might help if a young person is not yet ready to move on.

Mainstream colleges

Mainstream colleges offer a wide range of courses to suit all levels of learning. For example:

- Academic courses (A Levels, GCSEs).
- Vocational courses (such as BTECs and T Levels).

This discussion should form part of the annual review if they have an EHC plan.

Once a suitable college is chosen, the school should work with the new setting to ensure a smooth transition.

What support is available at college?

Mainstream colleges support students with special educational needs in a similar way to schools.

Students with SEN who do not need EHC plans are given help through SEN support. This includes following the special educational needs and disability code of practice: 0-25 years. There will be a named person in overall charge of SEN



provision and the college has to make sure that students with SEN know who they can go to for help.

Young people who need more help than a mainstream FE college could normally provide will need an EHC plan.

Specialist colleges

Specialist colleges provides education for young people with SEN only.

A young person would need an EHC plan to go to a specialist college.

Other education and training options

Education is not confined to classroom based learning in a school or college. There are also training options, these give a young person the chance to experience a workplace and develop the skills they will need in a particular job.

Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships are open to young people over 16 with or without EHC plans, and they can lead to qualifications.

Apprenticeship providers receive an increased amount of money for a young person with an EHC plan.

Traineeships

A traineeship is a programme which helps young people gain skills to get a job or apprenticeship. Usually traineeships are unpaid and last for six months or less.

Supported internship

A supported internship is a workplace training and study programme open to young people with EHC plans aged between 16-24. Supported internships are unpaid, based mainly at an employer. The aim of a supported internship is to enable the intern to take up paid employment at the end of the internship.

Education, Health and Care (EHC) plans after 16

If a child has an EHC plan, it does not have to end when they leave school. A plan can continue up to the age of 25 as long as they still have SEN and stay in some kind of education or training.

Transition to adult health and social care services for individuals with EHC plans

If a young person needs ongoing health or social care support, at some point they will move from child to adult services. This is likely to happen around the age of 18, but it can happen at a younger or older age.

The local authority a legal duty to work with other services to ensure that education, health and social care support is coordinated for children with EHC plans.

Transition planning should form part of the annual review of your son or daughter's EHC plan. A named worker is identified, and this person takes the lead in coordinating care and support before, during and after transfer to adult services.



Choices College is a Specialist Post-16 College that delivers an OFSTED and Education Skills Funding Agency approved curriculum, that links into additional NCFE accredited provision. All educational-based delivery is embedded into a learner's work-place training and learning.

We have over 200 learners across several local authorities, in the UK and our staff work closely with over 14 National Health Service (NHS) trusts. Entry Requirement

Entry requirements for this programme are that students are aged 16-24, have a learning disability and an Education, Health and Care Plan in place, who also:

- would like to find a job
- will be ready for work after completing the programme
- will be able to travel independently by the end of the programme

The internship programme is a full-time study programme that runs throughout the academic year (September to July)

- Interns will be offered up to three placements, lasting 10-12 weeks each
- Interns spend three days per week in work, with up to two days in the classroom. In the classroom, Interns learn about employment and develop employability skills, as well as having study time to improve Maths and English.
- Interns are supported by a Workplace Mentor, Project Coordinator and an Area Manager.

Our Supported Internship is a one year full time study programme for 16–24 year olds who have a Statement for Special Educational Needs or an Education and Health Care Plan. The Curriculum Offer:

The curriculum offer is fundamentally focussed on preparation for adult life and covers the following areas:

- Communication, Employability (including English and mathematics), Health & Wellbeing, Independent living skills
- Community and inclusion (Friends, Relationships, Citizenship, British values, Rights & Responsibilities).

Pathway to Working Life

The programme is based around work experience and employability skills with a vocational taster based on the individual's future plans of progression.

Pathway to independence

This pathway enables students to acquire knowledge, understanding and skills in a number of areas including Community Living Skills, Communication/Social Interaction and Health and Wellbeing.

WHAT WE OFFER:

College bridging programme

School leavers (aged 16 years) who are able to access formal qualifications (functional skills or GCSE).

This course is based at college 4 days a week and includes core lessons in English, Maths, ICT and PE plus a vocational option (e.g. Creative Media or Construction) as well as a full day focused on career planning, life skills and PSHE/RSE. On the fifth day students independently access an individual work experience placement to further build their practical work skills.

Broaden Horizons bridging programme

School leavers (aged 16 years) who are unable to access formal qualifications or who need additional support to develop independence skills.

This course is aimed at learners requiring more support to become increasingly independent as they get closer to adulthood. Students access English, Maths, ICT, PE, PSHE/RSE and a series of vocational tasters (e.g. Catering & Hospitality, Construction, Horticulture & Retail). In addition, students access supported work experience placements as a whole class.

Students who follow the Broadening Horizons bridging programme would generally progress onto our Pre-Internship and then our Supported Internship.

PROGRESSION:

Pre-internship programme

Students working towards a Supported Internship Programme but who need additional time to prepare for a transition into employment.


This course is for students who are coming to the end of their time in education and who are almost ready to join a Supported Internship programme.

Students access lessons to continue building on their literacy, numeracy and digital skills as well as their employability skills. Students also access a range of work tasters to support them in creating their 'vocational profile' based on real experiences.

Supported Internship programme

16-25 year old students ready to transition into employment.

This course is for students who are keen to transition into employment but need help to do so. Interns will access a work placement based with an employer. All placements act as a 'working interview' with a view to a paid job being offered at the end of the placement for all successful interns. In addition, interns access a core class day where they continue to improve their English, Maths and Work/Life skills and are also able to work towards relevant workplace qualifications e.g. First Aid, Health & Safety, Food hygiene.

How can www.BarnetYouth.uk support children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) to access activities?

Within our different projects, BACE Holidays, DofE and Positive Activities term time and holidays we have various support offers.

The Barnet Youth offer is an inclusive provision with three different ways in which children with SEND needs can access the programmes activities.

The types of provision are:

- Mainstream provision which children of mixed abilities will play alongside one another.
- Exclusive SEND Activities, specifically for children whose needs are better met within a specialist or target provision.
- Family SEND provisions where parent and child/siblings attend.

Often children with SEND don't require 1:1 support within the activities. However, we understand that every child is unique and their needs vary. Therefore, if your child does need specialist 1:1 support and qualifies for short breaks* or direct funding, you can provide a support worker for your child to access mainstream activities. You will need to notify us in advance of the session and support workers will need to supply their DBS information upon arrival.

Currently BACE Holidays is the only project that is able to fund a limited amount of 1:1 support workers. BACE Following the HAF guidance all eligible children are offered up to 4 hours a day of provisions up to 16 days in the Summer. SEND children accessing BACE in need of 1:1 support will receive the same amount of hours and days as above. If parents request extended hours either side of the 4 hours funded by BACE, SEND support arrangements for the agreed extended hours will need to be discussed with the provider direct. (BACE Holidays do not fund additional hours).
